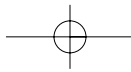
Becta is committed to improve learning and teaching through the effective and integrated use of information and communications technology (ICT).

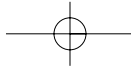

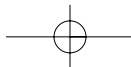


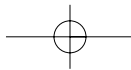
ICT Advice website

English for speakers of other languages (ESOL)

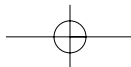
Communication Aids Project (CAP)

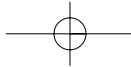

Using educational content with new technology

Have you PDAs, interactive whiteboards or tablet PCs at your primary school? And are you not sure how to integrate them into your teaching? Effective use of ICT in subject teaching – Primary

The activities on this CD-ROM are based on evidence of what works, and are drawn from the experiences of real teachers. Each activity is graded to ensure that it links in a real way with the skills and techniques that the learners have been taught. The activities illustrate how ICT can be used to introduce the lesson, form part of the main teaching activity or be included in the plenary. And, best of all, all the supporting resources that you need to run the lessons are included on the CD-ROM.

You may also take inspiration from video case studies featuring Becta award winners talking about their own use of ICT in the classroom. You will find the curriculum and technology hints invaluable, and pick up useful tips from the question-and-answer sections where expert practitioners give practical classroom ideas and point to supporting resources that will help you build and develop your own approach to using ICT in your teaching.

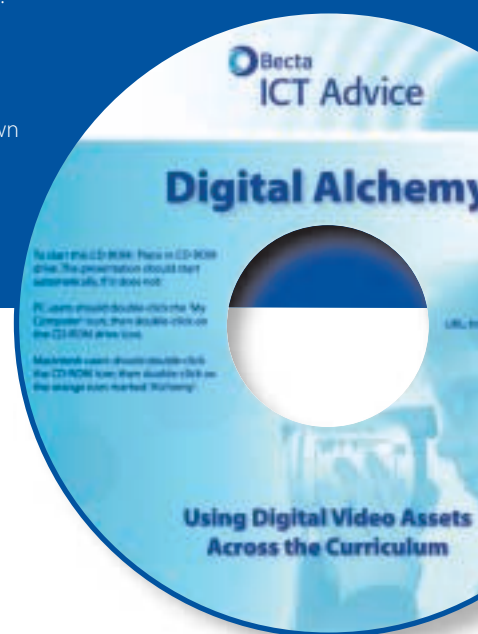
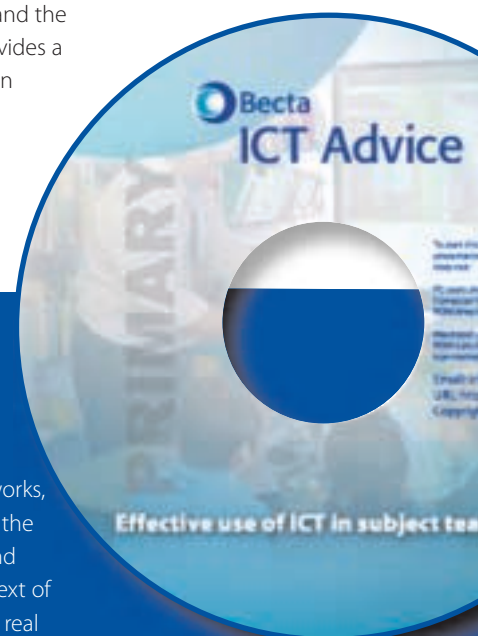
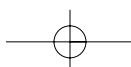
Using digital video assets across the curriculum

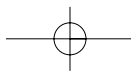
This free CD-ROM offers advice and guidance on using digital video assets to support subject learning and teaching.

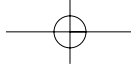
ICT Advice magazines

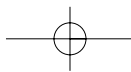

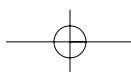
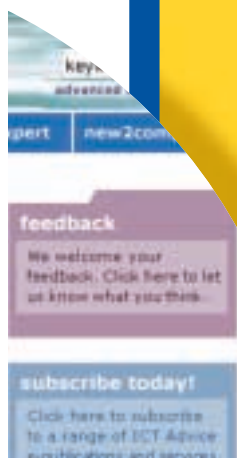
Hands-on Support National Online Network
